INTRODUCTION

The Center for Security Policy is pleased to release its eleventh National Security Scorecard since its first in 1994. As with previous iterations, it is designed to illuminate the voting record of members of the United States Senate and House of Representatives on important defense and foreign policy issues.

Toward that end, this edition of the National Security Scorecard conforms to the approach taken in previous versions. We have selected Congressional votes on the basis of their significance to the vital security policy interests of the United States. We have, moreover, selected votes that offer real insights into the attitude of the legislators casting them concerning critical national security issues of the day.

Such considerations prompt us generally to exclude near---unanimous votes, non---controversial or hortatory resolutions, or votes on final passage of each chambers' annual defense spending bills or their conference reports.

It is important to note that while the scorecard is a critical tool for analyzing a legislator's national security record, it is not the only measure of that record. By definition, scorecards look only at issues that were brought to a vote — they do not capture statements or other forms of discussion and debate, on and off Capitol Hill, that also contribute to the totality of a legislator's views.

In producing this year's National Security Scorecard, the Center for Security Policy hopes to assist the American people in understanding the performance of their elected officials with respect to vital national security issues—and to encourage greater accountability on the part of Senators and Members of Congress for their votes in this portfolio.

Scores are bases upon the legislator's aggregate record on these important votes. If, for example, a Senator was absent for two of the examined votes, but cast his or her remaining votes in a pro-national security way, he or she would receive a total score of 100%. The same applies for votes taken before a Senator assumed office in mid-term; votes for the session from before he or she started serving do not count towards the total votes cast.

House Vote Descriptions, 2013-2014

1. **Fund construction of facilities in U.S. for Guantanamo detainees.** The Moran amendment (Virginia – 8th District) removed restrictions from the FY 2014 Military Construction Appropriations bill that prohibited the use of funds to construct, renovate or expand any facility in the United States to house a Guantanamo Bay detainee. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 170---254, 9 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 190, June 4, 2013)
2. **Reduce the number of Navy's operational aircraft carriers.** The Blumenauer amendment (Oregon – 3rd District) to the FY 2014 National Defense Authorization Act reduced from 11 to 10 the number of operational aircraft carriers the U.S. Navy must have. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 106---318, 10 not voting (Roll Call Vote #222, June 13, 2013)
3. **Maintain “warm” status for land---based nuclear deterrent.** The Lummis amendment (Wyoming – at---Large) to the FY 2014 National Defense Authorization Act required that Inter---Continental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) silos remain in “warm” status. Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 235---189, 10 not voting (Roll Call Vote #223, June 13, 2013)
4. **Eliminate military detention for persons detained in the United States per the AUMF.** The Smith amendment (Washington---8th District) to the FY 2014 National Defense Authorization Act eliminated provisions allowing for indefinite military detention of individuals captured/detained in the United States pursuant to the 2001 Authorization for the Use of Military Force (AUMF). Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 200---226, 8 not voting (Roll Call Vote #228, June 13, 2013)
5. **Demand President Obama provide information on missile defense reductions.** The Turner amendment (Ohio---10th District) to the FY 2014 National Defense Authorization Act provided a Sense of Congress that the president should immediately disclose to Congress the details of any proposed deals with Russia concerning U.S. missile defense or nuclear deterrence. Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 239---182, 13 not voting (Roll Call Vote #229, June 14, 2013)
6. **Provide funding to implement New START arms control treaty.** The Larsen amendment (Washington – 2nd District) to the FY 2014 National Defense Authorization Act restored funding for U.S. nuclear arsenal reductions required by the New START arms control treaty with Russia. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 195---229, 10 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 233, June 14, 2013)
7. **Shut down Guantanamo Bay detention operations.** The Smith amendment (Washington---9th District) detailed a plan to close down detention operations at Guantanamo Bay and effectuate the transfer of detainees out of Guantanamo Bay by Dec. 31, 2014. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 174---249, 11 not voting (Roll Call Vote #237, June 14, 2013)
8. **Reduce funding for nuclear deterrence.** The Foster amendment (Illinois, 11th District) to the FY 2014 Energy/Water Appropriations Act reduced Department of Energy weapons activities by \$500 million while increasing funding for DoE's Office of Science by a similar amount. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 143---273, 18 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 327, July 9, 2013)
9. **Reduce funding for east coast missile defense.** The Nadler amendment (New York, 10th District) to the FY 2014 Department of Defense Appropriations Act reduced funding for an East Coast Missile Defense site by \$70.2 million and put the money towards deficit reduction instead. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 173---249, 11 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 384, July 23, 2013)

- 10. Eliminate restrictions on transfer of Guantanamo Bay detainees.** The Moran amendment (Virginia, 8th District) to the FY 2014 Department of Defense Appropriations Act eliminated restrictions in place preventing the use of federal funds for the transfer of Guantanamo Bay detainees to the United States or a third country, and eliminated restrictions on the use of federal funds to modify a U.S. facility to house Guantanamo detainees. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 175---247, 11 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 385, July 23, 2013)
- 11. Limit funds for inter---continental ballistic missiles.** The Quigley amendment (Illinois, 5th District) to the FY 2014 Department of Defense Appropriations Act prohibits federal funding in the FY 2014 Defense Appropriations bill from being used to operate or maintain more than three hundred land---based inter---continental ballistic missiles (ICBMs). Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 142---283, 8 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 397, July 23, 2013)
- 12. No funding to detain Guantanamo detainees cleared for release or transfer to third countries.** The Nadler amendment (New York, 10th District) to the FY 2014 Department of Defense Appropriations Act prohibited federal funds from being used to detain individuals at Guantanamo Bay who have been cleared for release or transfer to third countries. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 176---242, 15 not voting (Roll Call Vote #408, July 24, 2013)
- 13. Stop NSA phone record metadata collection.** The Amash amendment (Michigan, 3rd District) to the FY 2014 Department of Defense Appropriations Act halted the National Security Agency's collection of phone records metadata under Section 215 of the Patriot Act unless the individual subject to surveillance is under investigation. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 205---217, 12 not voting (Roll Call Vote #412, July 24, 2013)
- 14. Fund construction of facilities in U.S. for Guantanamo detainees.** The Moran amendment (Virginia – 8th District) removed restrictions from the FY 2015 Military Construction Appropriations bill that prohibited the use of funds to construct, renovate or expand any facility in the United States to house a Guantanamo Bay detainee. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 168---249, 14 not voting (Roll Call Vote #185, April 30, 2014)
- 15. Maintain “warm” status for land---based nuclear deterrent.** The Daines amendment (Montana – at---Large) struck language from the FY 2015 National Defense Authorization Act that terminates, by 2021, the requirement that Inter---Continental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) silos remain in “warm” status. Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 222---196, 13 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 227, May 21, 2014)
- 16. Shut down Guantanamo Bay detention operations.** The Smith amendment (Washington---9th District) to the FY 2015 National Defense Authorization Act detailed a plan to close down detention operations at Guantanamo Bay and effectuate the transfer of detainees out of Guantanamo Bay by Dec. 31, 2016. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 177---247, 7 not voting (Roll Call Vote #233, May 22, 2014)
- 17. Eliminate military detention for persons detained in the United States per the AUMF.** The Smith amendment (Washington---8th District) to the FY 2015 National Defense Authorization Act eliminated provisions allowing for indefinite military detention of individuals captured/detained in the United States pursuant to the 2001 Authorization for the Use of Military Force (AUMF). Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 191---230, 10 not voting (Roll Call Vote #234, May 22, 2014)

- 18. No funding for Russia arms control agreement.** The Lamborn amendment (Colorado---5th district) to the National Defense Authorization Act prevented federal funds for implementation of the New Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (New START) with Russia until the Department of Defense could certify that Russia was respecting the sovereignty of Ukraine and was in compliance with other arms control agreements to which it is a party. Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 233---191, 7 not voting (Roll Call Vote #236, May 22, 2014)
- 19. Spend federal funds to close Guantanamo.** The Moran amendment (Virginia---8th District) struck sections of the FY 2015 Commerce---Justice---Science Appropriations Act that prohibited the use of federal funds for the transfer or release any Guantanamo Bay detainee, or for the construction of any facility in the U.S. to house a Guantanamo Bay detainee. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 169---230, 32 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 254, May 30, 2014)
- 20. Shield journalists from disclosing confidential sources.** The Grayson amendment (Florida---9th District) to the FY 2015 Commerce---Justice---Science Appropriations Act prohibited federal funds from being used to compel a journalist to testify about information or sources the journalist regards as confidential. Pro national---security vote: NO; passed 225---183, 23 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 263, May 30, 2014)
- 21. Deny federal funds for transfer of U.S. oversight of the Internet.** The Duffy amendment (Wisconsin---7th District) to the FY 2015 Commerce---Justice---Science Appropriations Act prohibited funds available in the FY 2015 Commerce---Justice---Science Appropriations Act from being used to relinquish sole U.S. oversight of the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN). Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 229---178, 24 not voting (Roll Call Vote #264, May 30, 2014)
- 22. No funding for Guantanamo detainee transfers to Yemen.** The Walorski amendment (Indiana---2nd District) prohibited FY 2015 Defense Appropriations funding from being used to transfer or release to Yemen any detainee in custody at Guantanamo Bay on or after June 24, 2009. Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 238---179, 14 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 321, June 19, 2014).
- 23. No funding for Authorization for Use of Military Force in Iraq.** The Lee amendment (California – 13th District) prohibited FY 2015 Defense Appropriations funding from being used pursuant to the Authorization for the Use of Military Force Against Iraq Resolution of 2002. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 182---231, 18 not voting (Roll Call Vote #326, June 20, 2014)
- 24. No funding for weapons in Syria.** The Fortenberry amendment (Nebraska – 1st District) prohibited FY 2015 Defense Appropriations funding for use in distribution of weapons in Syria. Pro---national security vote: YES; failed 167---244, 20 not voting (Roll Call Vote #328, June 20, 2014)
- 25. No funding for combat operations in Afghanistan.** The Lee amendment (California – 13th District) prohibits funds in the FY 2015 Defense Appropriations bill from being used for combat operations in Afghanistan after December 31st, 2014. Pro---national security vote: NO; failed 153---260, 18 not voting (Roll Call Vote # 332, June 20, 2014)
- 26. Prohibit funding for terrorist entities.** The Gosar amendment (Arizona – 4th District) prohibited FY 2015 Defense Appropriations funding for distribution to the Government of Iran, the Government of Syria, the Palestinian Authority, Hamas, and the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria (ISIS). Pro---national security vote: YES; passed 280---133, 18 not voting (Roll Call Vote #335, June 20, 2014)

27. Arming and training “moderate” forces in Syria. The McKeon amendment (California – 25th District) granted President Obama the authority to train and arm “vetted”, “moderate” Syrian opposition forces to fight the Islamic State. Pro---national security vote: NO; passed 273---156, 3 not voting (Roll Call Vote #507, September 17, 2014)

Senate Vote Descriptions, 2013-2014

1. **Stop military aid to Egypt's Morsi government.** The Paul amendment (R--- Kentucky) prohibited the sale, transfer or delivery of F---16s, tanks and other defense platforms to the Government of Egypt, which at the time was under the control of Mohammed Morsi, leader of the Muslim Brotherhood. The vote was on the motion to table (or end debate on) the Paul amendment. Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to 79---19, 2 not voting. (Vote #9, Jan. 31, 2013)
2. **End debate on nomination of Sen. Chuck Hagel to be Secretary of Defense and proceed to confirmation vote.** The Senate voted on a motion to end debate (or "motion to invoke cloture") on the nomination of Sen. Chuck Hagel to be Secretary of Defense and proceed to an up---or---down vote on the nomination. Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to 71---27, 2 not voting. (Vote #23, Feb. 26, 2013)
3. **Confirmation of Sen. Chuck Hagel to be Secretary of Defense.** Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to 58---41, 1 not voting. (Vote #24, Feb. 26, 2013)
4. **Confirmation of John Brennan to be Director of the Central Intelligence Agency.** Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to 63---34, 3 not voting. (Vote #32, March 7, 2013)
5. **Redirect foreign aid from Egypt's Morsi government towards U.S. missile defense.** The Cruz amendment (R---Texas) reduced foreign assistance to Egypt's Morsi government and increased funding for missile defense capabilities on the east coast of the United States. Pro---national security vote: YES; Rejected 25---74, 1 not voting (Vote #85, March 23, 2013)
6. **Oppose U.S. entry into the United Nations Arms Trade Treaty.** The Inhofe amendment (R---Oklahoma) expressed opposition to U.S. entry into the United Nations Arms Trade Treaty (ATT), a treaty that purports to regulate international transfers of conventional weapons but also infringes upon 2nd Amendment constitutional freedoms. Pro---national security vote: YES; Agreed to 53---46, 1 not voting (Vote #91, March 23, 2013).
7. **Oppose provisional immigration status absent secure borders.** The Grassley amendment (R---Iowa) prohibited the granting of provisional immigrant status to those who have entered the United States illegally until the Department of Homeland Security has maintained effective control of U.S. borders for six months. The vote was on the motion to table (or end debate on) the Grassley amendment. Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to 57---43 (Vote #148, June 13, 2013)
8. **Oppose provisional immigration status absent increased border fencing.** The Thune amendment (R---South Dakota) prohibited the granting of provisional immigrant status to those who have entered the United States illegally until the completion 350 miles of reinforced, double---layered fencing along the border, and prohibited the upgrading of any such individuals from provisional immigrant status to permanent resident status until the completion of 700 miles of such fencing. Pro---national security vote: YES; Rejected 39---54, 7 not voting (Vote #151, June 18, 2013)

9. **Oppose temporary legal status for illegal entrants to the U.S. absent implementation of US---VISIT.** The Vitter amendment (R---Louisiana) prohibited the granting of temporary legal status, or adjustment to citizenship status, to those who have entered the United States illegally, until the Department of Homeland Security certifies, and Congress concurs, that the US---VISIT system has been fully implemented at every port of entry. Pro---national security vote: YES; Rejected 36---58, 6 not voting (Vote #152, June 18, 2013)
10. **End debate on comprehensive immigration reform.** The Senate voted on a motion to invoke cloture on the Border Security, Economic Opportunity, and Immigration Modernization Act (known colloquially as comprehensive immigration reform), and proceed to an up---or---down vote on the proposed legislation. Pro--- national security vote: NO; Agreed to 68---32 (Vote #167, June 27, 2013)
11. **Provide for comprehensive immigration reform.** The Senate voted on the Border Security, Economic Opportunity, and Immigration Modernization Act (known colloquially as comprehensive immigration reform), which provides increased resources for border security while offering a “pathway to citizenship” for those residing in the United States illegally. Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to 68---32 (Vote #168, June 27, 2013)
12. **Confirmation of Samantha Power to be U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations.** Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to, 87---10, 3 not voting. (Vote #200, Aug. 1, 2013)
13. **Restrict transfer of unlawful enemy combatants from Guantanamo Bay.** The Ayotte amendment (R---New Hampshire) prohibited the use of federal funds to transfer a Guantanamo detainee to a foreign country unless the Secretary of Defense certifies to Congress at least thirty days prior to the transfer that certain criteria have been met, and also prohibited the use of federal funds to transfer Guantanamo detainees to the United States or build/upgrade any facilities within the United States for that purpose. Pro---national security vote: YES; Rejected 43---55, 2 not voting (Vote #237, Nov. 19, 2013)
14. **Allow transfer of unlawful enemy combatants from Guantanamo Bay into the United States.** The Levin amendment (D---Michigan) allowed the Secretary of Defense to transfer detainees from Guantanamo Bay into the United States for detention, trial and/or incarceration if he determines the transfer is in the national security interests of the United States, determines that actions have been taken/will be taken to address the public safety risks associated with such transfer, and notifies Congress at least thirty days prior to the transfer. Pro---national security vote: NO; Rejected 52---46, 2 not voting (per Senate rules on the date of the vote, this amendment required passage by a 3/5 majority) (Vote #238, Nov. 19, 2013)
15. **Confirmation of Rose Gottemoeller to be Undersecretary of State for Arms Control and International Security.** Pro---national security vote: NO; Agreed to, 58--- 42 (Vote #58, March 6 2014)
